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Sunday, March 4

Romans 8:1-10 Those who live according to the sinful nature have their minds set on what that nature desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. The mind of the of sinful man is death, but the mind controlled by the Spirit is life and peace. (vv.5-6 NIV)

As a follower of Jesus Christ, I have graciously been given a choice. Do I follow the directive of the Holy Spirit or do I fall victim to the temptations of the world? For me, the answer is much more complex than meets the eye. I read my Bible, attend a Bible study, praise God for His blessings, but day by day and minute by minute I must choose whom I will follow.

A few weeks ago, I found myself becoming anxious regarding some major milestones about to occur within my family. I was trying to control the outcome before the events occurred. Believe me, I was distressed. I realize that if I do not ask God to guide my path on a moment to moment basis each day, I will not live the peaceful, balanced life that He calls me to live. E. Stanley Jones said, "If you don't surrender to Christ, you surrender to chaos." I am saddened when I think of the people who do not even recognize they have a choice. Through this experience, I now understand the importance of sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Psalm 80 Restore us, O LORD God Almighty; make your face shine upon us, that we may be saved. (v.19)

Genesis 45:1-15 Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come close to me." When they had done so, he said to them, "I am your brother Joseph, the one you sold into Egypt! And now, do not be distressed, and do not be angry with yourselves for selling me here, because it was to save lives that God sent me ahead of you. For two years now there has been famine in the land, and for the next five years there will not be plowing and reaping. But God sent me ahead of you to preserve for you a remnant of earth and to save your lives by a great deliverance." (vv.4-7)

I have a deep admiration for Joseph. It must have been extremely disheartening to have your own brothers turn against you. Did Joseph wallow in self-pity and bitterness? He chose a different path. He made the best of a situation, trusted in God, waited patiently for deliverance, and did it all with a heart of forgiveness. He was a man of faith who exemplified the body of Christ.

In the book of Jeremiah, chapter 29, it says, "Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce" (v.5). During my life there have been times that I have been asked to go to places I normally would not choose to go to. It is at these times I pray, "Lord, please allow me to remember that Your hand is with me wherever I go. I wish to focus on You and make the best of every situation."
