Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

This week our Adult Formation conversation was on the Sacrament of Baptism and we explored the Baptismal Covenant in the Book of Common Prayer.

In the Covenant we confess the faith as received in the Apostles' Creed, and take on five further promises.

- 1. To remain in the Apostles' teaching (essentially the Creeds), fellowship (meeting with fellow believers for mutual edification in a specific local body), the breaking of bread (Holy Eucharist), and in the prayers (the offices and personal prayer).
- 2. To persevere in resisting evil and when we fall into sin to repent and return to the Lord.
- 3. To proclaim by word AND example the Good News of God in Christ.
- 4. To seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves.
- 5. To strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being.

These are the promises we make each time we baptize a new Christian or renew our Baptismal Covenant. These are the promises by which we are made accountable as members of Christ's body.

Each of these promises build upon the other and grows out of our commitment to the previous

The Months of March and April 2018

Mid Central Community Action's (MCCA) emergency shelter, **Neville House**, provides safe harbor, assists and provides families in crisis situations with individual and group counseling for adults and children, and serves as a community resource providing awareness, advocacy, and education on the issue of domestic violence.

Neville House personnel have suggested the following necessary supplies for the shelter and its residents: women, children and occasionally men.

<u>Personal hygiene items</u>: full size shampoos, conditioners and body wash for men, women and children, along with bath soaps and lotions, towels and washcloths;

<u>Clothing</u>: women's underwear in various sizes, along with brassieres (C-cups plus); men's clothing and underwear in sizes M/L;

<u>Shoes and/or sneakers</u>: in a variety of sizes for men, women and children;

<u>Laundry and Cleaning supplies</u>; Laundry detergent, bath and kitchen cleaning products, paper towels and toilet paper; Kitchen supplies: non perishable items, canned soups and me

<u>Kitchen supplies</u>: non-perishable items, canned soups and meats, and boxed meals for the pantry;

Gift cards and/or monetary gifts*; grocery, and other gift cards help

provide fresh produce, dairy and other perishable items for the kitchen, or other resident needs. Monetary and gas cards assist in transporting residents to doctor appointments, job interviews, and/or their children to school/daycare.

Please place supplies in the Outreach baskets in the narthex and the hallway beside the fireplace. We bless and thank each and every one of you for your continued generosity to those in need in our community.

The First Lesson

Acts 4:5-12

The rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, "Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.'

There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved."

The Epistle

1 John 3:16-24

We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.

And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

The Gospel

John 10:11-18

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away-and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I

know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."
