Rector's Ramblings

St. Matthew

Today is our Patronal Feast, the Feast of St. Matthew. Following custom we will transfer this feast to this Sunday. This means that the Collect and Hymns for this Sunday will especially focus on St. Matthew and his legacy.

St. Matthew (AKA Levi son of Alphaeus) was a tax collector and immediately left his stall upon hearing Jesus call him. He was present at Pentecost, but after that information is sparse, save for Holy Tradition that he preached in Asia Minor, Parthia, and Ethiopia. Papias, a second century Church scholar records that Matthew is responsible for the Gospel that bears his name, and that he first recorded the sayings of Jesus in Aramaic (the language of Galilee, Judea, and Syria at the time). It is the Greek translation of these sayings that has come down to us today.

Blessed Matthew Apostle and Evangelist, pray for us.

First Reading

Wisdom of Solomon 1:16-2:1, 12-22

The ungodly by their words and deeds summoned death;

considering him a friend, they pined away

and made a covenant with him,

because they are fit to belong to his company.

For they reasoned unsoundly, saying to themselves,

"Short and sorrowful is our life,

and there is no remedy when a life comes to its end,

and no one has been known to return from Hades.

Let us lie in wait for the righteous man,

because he is inconvenient to us and opposes our actions;

he reproaches us for sins against the law,

and accuses us of sins against our training.

He professes to have knowledge of God,

and calls himself a child of the Lord.

He became to us a reproof of our thoughts;

the very sight of him is a burden to us,

because his manner of life is unlike that of others,

and his ways are strange.

We are considered by him as something base,

and he avoids our ways as unclean;

he calls the last end of the righteous happy,

and boasts that God is his father.

Let us see if his words are true,

and let us test what will happen at the end of his life;

for if the righteous man is God's child, he will help him, and will deliver him from the hand of his adversaries.

Let us test him with insult and torture,

so that we may find out how gentle he is,

and make trial of his forbearance.

Let us condemn him to a shameful death,

for, according to what he says, he will be protected."

Thus they reasoned, but they were led astray,

for their wickedness blinded them,

and they did not know the secret purposes of God, nor hoped for the wages of holiness,

nor discerned the prize for blameless souls.

Psalm 54 Deus, in nomine 1 Save me, O God, by your Name; * in your might, defend my cause. 2 Hear my prayer, O God; * give ear to the words of my mouth. 3 For the arrogant have risen up against me, and the ruthless have sought my life, * those who have no regard for God. 4 Behold, God is my helper; * it is the Lord who sustains my life. 5 Render evil to those who spy on me; * in your faithfulness, destroy them. 6 I will offer you a freewill sacrifice * and praise your Name, O Lord, for it is good. 7 For you have rescued me from every trouble, * and my eye has seen the ruin of my foes.

The Epistle James 3:13-4:10

13 Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. 14But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. 15Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. 16For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. 17But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. 18And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for* those who make peace.

4Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? 2You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet* something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. 3You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures. 4Adulterers! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. 5Or do you suppose that it is for nothing that the scripture says, 'God* yearns jealously for the spirit that he has made to dwell in us'? 6But he gives all the more grace; therefore it says, 'God opposes the proud,

but gives grace to the humble.'
7Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he

will flee from you. 8Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. 9Lament and mourn and weep. Let your laughter be turned into mourning and your joy into dejection. 10Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you.

The Gospel Mark 9:30-37

Jesus and his disciples passed through Galilee. He did not want anyone to know it; for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, "The Son of Man is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again." But they did not understand what he was saying and were afraid to ask him.

Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, "What were you arguing about on the way?" But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."
