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### Sunday, May 5

Daniel 4:1-18 "This is the dream that I, King Nebuchadnezzar, had. Now, Belteshazzar, tell me what it means, for none of the wise men in my kingdom can interpret it for me. But you can, because the spirit of the holy gods is in you." (v.18 NIV)

My dreams are usually "fluff" that dissolves upon awakening. Once in a while, however, I have a dream that is powerfully clear in content, but not in meaning. It comes with an urgent sense of importance and I know I need to find its meaning. I consider these to be messages delivered by the Holy Spirit of God. Like Nebuchadnezzar, who knew his dream had meaning and sought out those he thought could interpret it, I search for answers. I am reminded how important it is to go to the right source for dream interpretation. We can easily be led into occult mysteries that fuel our curiosity and draw us into the enemy camp. How fortunate we are to be living on the other side of Easter where the Holy Spirit can dwell within us and guide us in the way of Truth! He is able to reveal to us whatever we need to know.

# Monday, May 6

Daniel 4:19-27 "Therefore, O king, be pleased to accept my advice: Renounce your sins by doing what is right, and your wickedness by being kind to the oppressed. It may be that then your prosperity will continue." (v.27)

Many times the Lord has shown me, through dreams, the direction I need to go and I have said, "Later, I'll do it later." Why is it so hard to change when we know we will be better off for it? We ask for advice, then refuse to take it. For me, it usually means stepping out of my comfort zone. When I do take the risk and take that step, I am rewarded beyond measure. Daniel 4:28-37 Now I, Nebuchadnezzar, praise and exalt and glorify the King of heaven, because everything he does is right and all his ways are just. And those who walk in pride he is able to humble. (v.37)

God punished Nebuchadnezzar for seven years until he was humbled and willing to acknowledge God as all powerful. Then his kingdom was restored. # Friday, May 10

Luke 5:12-26 But despite Jesus' instructions, the report of his power spread even faster, and vast crowds came to hear him preach and to be healed of their diseases. But Jesus often withdrew to the wilderness for prayer. (vv.15-16)

In the midst of our busyness we must take time to pray. Often that is when prayer is most needed.

In the hospital as I recovered from hip surgery, my roommate, Joyce, and I were in much pain from all the peripheral stuff—anesthesia, infections, and antibiotics. Early one morning as I lay there deep in my own pity-party, a revelation hit me: Satan loves pain, not so much because it hurts but because it isolates. He doesn't want to see two or three Christians gathered together! So, I pulled back the curtain that separated us and shared my news with Joyce. We decided the best weapon was *praise*. We would sing! Very softly (at 5:30 a.m.) we began "Jesus Loves Me." Soon we heard a third voice. Our nurse had arrived and joined in. Our hearts began to fill with joy as we sang and prayed together. It did not take away the pain, but it became much easier to endure. We even forgot about the pain for a while! Through that experience, I learned something of the power of prayer. Psalm 105 says to "thank the Lord for all the glorious things he does: seek the Lord and his strength."

# Saturday, May 11

Luke 5:27-39 "I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." (v.32 NIV)

It is hard to confess when you are unaware of your sins. Through the years, I have gone from feeling righteous to being aware of sin in my life. Even now, it often catches me unaware. Not long ago, while being prayed for in my group, I knew I was being healed of something, but I didn't know what. My prayer partner said, "Ask Jesus." I replied, "All I get is 'stiff-necked." "What does that mean to you?" she asked. After some thought, I said, "Arrogance, but I know I am not arrogant!" (Arrogance never recognizes itself). Finally, I asked Jesus to show me where I was arrogant. He did. He showed me how I view art shows by judging the work and ignoring the artist—unless I really like what they do. Jesus said, "I want you to see my people, not just their work." So, I began to look at work that did not interest me and speak to the artist. In my arrogance I thought I was supposed to minister to them. Wrong again. They ministered to me. In many ways I was blessed beyond measure.

Jesus is still working on me and revealing new areas as I am able to accept them. He is too gentle and kind to overwhelm me with more truth than I can take. In Psalm 32:8, the Lord says, "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go."
