Continuing with questions about the Liturgy.

Q: What is a Eucharistic Minister? How do you get to serve in this way?

A: A Eucharistic Minister is an individual who has been licensed by the Bishop to assist the clergy in the distribution of Holy Communion. The licensing of "EMs" has been a part of common life since the last century.

In previous editions of the Canons this role has been known as a "Chalice Bearer" with the underlying assumption that the assistance given was reserved to the distribution of the Cup. However, that was not a correct understanding, as those called to participate in this ministry are authorized to assist in the distribution of both the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Eucharistic Minister is an "extraordinary" minister. Yes, they are extraordinary in their service, but they are

also "extra ordinary" in that EMs were authorized at a time when all liturgical Churches were full on Sunday and there were not enough clergy to distribute in a timely and effective manner. It is the ordained clergy who have responsibility, and authority, to handle and distribute Holy Communion in a reverential manner. When a Eucharistic Minister is present, he or she functions as a member of the "minor" order of the clergy. However, just as no one is entitled to be a priest or deacon, being an EM is a calling of the congregation to meet a specific need.

The qualifications to be a Eucharistic Minister may vary by congregation. At minimum you must be a confirmed member of the Church and undergo training by either the Deacon or the Priest. The Priest then requests the Bishop to grant a license that is valid for three-years.

The local priest can add other qualifications as he or she sees fit. My expectations follow.

Since Eucharistic Ministers function like a minor cleric, it is incumbent upon them to be people of faith, prayer, and study. Sabbatical

In full disclosure, and with the MLT's support, I am preparing to take Sabbatical beginning 1 June 2020. Sabbatical time is included in every Rector's letter of agreement and can be taken anytime after the first five years.

A sabbatical is not a vacation, or even continuing education, but a time for clergy to focus on renewal for ministry. It is supposed to be a time for developing new skills and/or learning new things that can enhance our Parish life.

For my sabbatical I will be joining Bishop Elias in Tabora, Tanzania. Bishop Daniel has tasked me in this with learning regular in their attendance at worship and participate in the wider life of the Community.

Since serving as an EM is an honor, a vocation given by the congregation, one so called should be ready to serve wherever and whenever needed, and like the regular clergy an EM gives up some control of their own liturgical life for the liturgical life of the Community. In other words it is not the Eucharistic Minister's need that drives the service, but the need of the community to which the EM responds. Of course allowance is made for vacations and work schedules, but if needed they should be ready to move between the different services to accommodate the needs of the worshiping community.

I also expect that the ministry of the Eucharistic Minister derives from other involvement in ministry. Serving at the Altar is a privilege and an honor, but it must be connected with serving Christ and His Church away from the Altar. Service at the altar cannot be the only ministry in an EMs life. An EM should be someone the congregation looks to as an example of ministry, faith,

how they are doing evangelism, clergy formation, and ministry development. The expectation is that a document will be produced outlining the above and how it might be beneficial to our Diocese and our Parish. Part of the plan is not just to preach and visit congregations, but to actively participate in clergy development through teaching Scripture to those in their formation program. I will also be teaching English at St. Peter's Secondary School in Tabora.

Supply clergy will support our liturgical life, and the Mission Leadership Team will support the administrative life of the Parish.

Unfortunately, some clergy misuse this time to search for other positions. However, please know that this is not appropriate nor will this be done.

Now, if anyone would like to join me for a portion of this trip, you are invited. A group portion would be appropriate for the first part of the time and would run roughly 1-19 June when Amy and Liam will be with me. If you are interested, please see me for cost estimate. I will need to make airline reservations by 1 November.

2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,

To Timothy, my beloved child:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God-- whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did-- when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.
