- 1. Come to church unless you are actually sick. If sick, stay home.
- 2. Please do not pass the peace via a handshake. The preferred method is the ancient practice of placing hands on the shoulders, but not a hug.
- 3. Anyone who handles the bread and chalice needs to wash their hands before doing so.
- 4. Suspension of selfintinction and recommending using the common cup as there is less danger of contamination via this method.
- 5. Reception of Holy Communion in one kind (host only) is a full Communion.

I would like to make a friendly challenge to my fellow members of St. Matthew's. I would like each of you to bring someone new, a friend, relative, co-worker, to something at St. Matthew's. It can be a Sunday morning worship service, Wednesday night adult formation, Evensong, morning prayer, theology uncorked, Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, or any other activity here. We have the good news; let's share it with the people we care about.

Gary Ploense Junior Warden the following changes.

- 1. Anyone who has symptoms, beyond seasonal allergies, needs to absent themselves from handling the host or the chalice, especially the Altar Party.
- 2. All clergy and Eucharistic Ministers will wash hands with soap and water before the service, and again before handling the elements if they touch their faces during the service.
- 3. There will be a cruet of alcohol on the credence table as a sanitizer. All clergy and EMs will use this before touching the bread or wine. The hosts for the congregation will be consecrated in the Ciborium (Bread Box).
- 4. The elements will not be brought forward at 10AM. They will be placed on the credence table before the service.
- 5. We will have two sides from which to receive communion. The pulpit side will be for those who wish to use the common cup. The lectern side will be for those who wish to receive by intinction. Deacon Tim will handle intinction and the EM will have the common cup. If you wish to receive the host only, you may do so on either side.

6. I am instituting the Tanzanian response to the HIV crisis as the guideline for intinction. The process is as follows: the Deacon will stand next to the Priest and the Priest will dip the host in the chalice and place it in the hands of the communicant.

7. If the Priest is ill, there will be no celebration of Holy Communion. Instead, Morning Prayer with Distribution by the Deacon will take its place. If both the Priest and Deacon are ill, Morning Prayer will be the order of the day.

I understand that these changes are quite radical, but until the crisis has passed they will remain in place. I truly hope they do not cause offense.

Even with all of these precautions in place, I am convinced that nothing deleterious is passed through receiving the Sacred Body and Blood of our Lord. I have been ordained for 16 years and have never gotten ill from consuming the remaining Eucharistic Wine, and I drink after everyone!

Praying thou has an Holy Lent and remain in good health!

Old Testament Genesis 12:1-4a

The Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him.

The Epistle

Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works,

he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") -in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

The Gospel John 3:1-17

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from

heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."
